LL.M. Susumu Takai is the President of Japan Security Strategy Research
Institute, SSRI. He graduated from the Postgraduate School of Aoyama Gakuin
University, and then started his carrier as a research fellow on international law at
the National Institute for Defense Studies, NIDS, of the Ministry of Defense. He engaged his
research on international law of the sea international law of air and space and UN Peacekeen

research on international law of the sea, international law of air and space and UN Peacekeeping. During the periods in NIDS, he provided his lecture on international law at various universities and postgraduate schools. He retired from NIDS when he was a director of the library and archives.

He focuses his research on legal aspects of defense studies and Japan's island territory issues. Among his books and articles, he contributed articles on Japan' island territory to the SPF Journal of Island Studies as follows: A History of the Northern Territories and Pertaining Rights (2018); Stalin's Definition of Northern territories (2015); China's White Papers on Senkaku Islands and Claim to the islands (2013); Re-examination of South Korea's Claim on Takeshima Island (2012).

Dr. Yano Yoshiaki, Senior Research Fellow, Security Strategy Research Institute of Japan

Yano Yoshiaki is Ph.D. in International Security Affairs of Takushoku University, and Visiting Professor, Gifu Women's University, Gifu City, Japan. He is former Visiting Lecturer of Tokyo Institute of Technology, Tokyo, Japan, Especially



Appointed Professor, University of Japan Economy, Tokyo, Japan and Visiting Professor, Takushoku University, Tokyo, Japan. He is also a member of Policy Proposal Committee of the Japan Forum of Strategic Studies (JFSS), Senior Researcher of Security and Strategy Research Institute of Japan (SSRI), and Director, Japan Society of Defense Law. He conducted a joint research in War Economy University, Paris, France. He was assigned to Vice Commander of the JGSDF First Division and Commander of the JGSDF Camp Nerima. His final assignment was Vice President of the JGSDF Kodaira School.

Gen. Osamu Onoda (ret.), Senior Research Fellow, Security Strategy Research Institute of Japan

Osamu Onoda is a senior research fellow of Security and Strategy Research Institute of Japan (SSRI). He is also an adviser for Toshiba Infrastructure Systems



& Solutions Corporation. He was a senior fellow of the Harvard University Asia Center in 2013 - 2015. He retired from Japan Air Self Defense Force (JASDF) as Lieutenant General in July 2012. The last assignment was Commander, Air Education and Training Command. He graduated from the National Defense Academy in 1977. His expertise in JASDF was a communication and electronics. He has commanded 3rd Air Depot, 7th Fighter Wing and the Western Air Force. His numerous staff positions in the Air Staff Office include the Director of Personnel and Education Department, the Head of Defense Planning and Program Division, and the program managers of E-767 Aircraft Control and Warning System, KC-767 Air Refueling Tanker Transport and C-2 Transport Aircraft.

His research focuses national security strategy and military capabilities of Japan, U.S. and China.

Dr. Robert McLaughlin, Professor of the Australian National University

Dr Rob McLaughlin researches, publishes, and teaches in the areas of Law of Armed Conflict, Law of the Sea, Maritime Security Law and Maritime Law Enforcement, and Military Law. He routinely engages in research activities, and course development and delivery, with the ICRC, the Australian Red Cross, the International Institute for Humanitarian Law, and the UN Office on Drugs and Crime.



Rob came to the ANU College of Law after a career in the Royal Australian Navy as a Seaman officer and a Legal officer. Consequently, his research interests are primarily focused around issues of practical operational significance.

His legal roles included as the Fleet Legal Officer, the Strategic Legal Adviser, as a Counsel Assisting the HMAS SYDNEY II Commission of Inquiry, Director Operations and International Law, and Director Naval Legal Service.

Dr. Jay L Batongbacal, Professor of the University of the Philippines

Jay L Batongbacal is a lawyer with degrees in Political Science and Law from the University of the Philippines, as well as Master of Marine Management and Doctor in the Science of Law, both from Dalhousie University (Canada). He has worked extensively on maritime affairs since 1997. Dr. Batongbacal was legal advisor to the



Philippine delegation that successfully pursued the Philippines' claim to a continental shelf beyond 200 nautical miles in the Benham Rise Region before the Commission on the Limits of the Continental Shelf in accordance with the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS), and the successful application before the International Maritime Organization for the designation of the Tubbataha Reef Natural Park Particularly Sensitive Sea Area. Presently, he is a full Professor and Executive Associate Dean of the University of the Philippines College of Law and chairs its Graduate Studies Committee which oversees the College's LLM Program. He is concurrently Director of the

Institute for Maritime Affairs and Law of the Sea of the U.P. Law Center.

Dr. Nguyen Hung Son, Vice President of the Diplomatic Academy of Vietnam

Nguyen Hung Son is Vice President of the Diplomatic Academy of Vietnam and Director-General of the East Sea (South China Sea) Institute. Prior to his current designation, Nguyen Hung Son was Deputy Director-General of the Institute for Strategic Studies at the Diplomatic Academy of Vietnam.



He's research focused on major powers relations, regional security governance, maritime security and Vietnam's foreign policy. As a diplomat, Nguyen Hung Son served as Minister Counsellor of the Vietnam Embassy in Ottawa, Canada (2015-2018) and Second Secretary of the Vietnam Embassy in Stockholm, Sweden (2004-2006).

He also served at the ASEAN department of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, during which period he extensively participated in regional summits, and had hands on experience on many regional processes and issues involving ASEAN. He was member of the Vietnam High Level Task Force delegation negotiating the ASEAN Charter in 2006-2007. While he was serving as the head of the ASEAN Standing Committee division at the ASEAN department of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Vietnam presided over the ASEAN Standing Committee from July 2000 to July 2001.

Nguyen Hung Son got his B.A degree from the National Economic University of Vietnam, an M.Sc degree on International Economics from Birmingham University of the United Kingdom, and a Phd degree on International Relations at the Diplomatic Academy of Vietnam.

Dr. James Kraska, Professor of the U.S. Naval War College

James Kraska is Chairman and Charles H. Stockton Professor of International Maritime Law in the Stockton Center for International Law at the U.S. Naval War College and Visiting Professor of Law and John Harvey Gregory Lecturer on World Organization at Harvard Law School. He has served as Visiting Professor



of Law at the University of the Philippines College of Law, Distinguished Fellow at the Law of the Sea Institute at University of California Berkeley School of Law, Visiting Professor of Law at Gujarat National Law University, Mary Derrickson McCurdy Visiting Scholar at Duke University Marine Laboratory, and Naval Research Fellow at Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution. He has published numerous books and articles and is Editor-in-Chief of International Law Studies and Editor-in-Chief of Benedict on Admiralty: International Maritime Law. He is a Permanent Member of the Council on Foreign Relations and served as a Navy officer and lawyer in senior positions in the Indo-Pacific region and the Pentagon.

Dr. Elena Atanassova-Cornelis, Senior Lecturer of the University of Antwerp

Dr. Elena Atanassova-Cornelis is a Senior Lecturer in International Relations of East Asia. She teaches at the Department of Politics, University of Antwerp (UA), and the School of Political and Social Sciences, Université Catholique de



Louvain (UCL), both in Belgium. She is concurrently a Visiting Professor at the Brussels School of International Studies (BSIS) of the University of Kent, as well as an Associate Fellow, Global Fellowship Initiative, at the Geneva Centre for Security Policy (GCSP) in Switzerland.

Her research interests and expertise include international relations in the Asia-Pacific region with an emphasis on security. She focuses, in particular, on Japanese foreign and security policy; alignments and major power relations in the Asia-Pacific region; security and geopolitics of the Taiwan Strait and the Korean Peninsula, as well as regional security cooperation in Asia and EU-Asia relations. Dr. Atanassova-Cornelis has authored 60 academic articles, book chapters, briefing papers and reports covering various topics related to Asian-Pacific politics and security, and Asia-Europe relations. She has delivered more than 90 lectures and presentations at conferences, high-level expert meetings, and universities in both Europe and Asia.

Dr Eva Pejsova, Senior Fellow at the Free University of Brussels

Eve Pejsova is a Senior Japan Fellow at the Free University of Brussels (VUB) and an Associate Fellow at the French "Fondation pour la Recherche Strategique" (FRS). Previously, Dr Pejsova was in charge of the Asia portfolio at the European Union Institute for Security Studies (EUISS), the EU's official agency for foreign and security policy research and analysis.



She holds a PhD in Strategic Studies from the S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies (RSIS) in Singapore and has previously worked with the Czech Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the French Prime Minister's Office, the OECD and the Asia-Europe Foundation (ASEF).

Dr Pejsova regularly lectures at SciencesPo (Paris School of International Affairs) in Paris, the Geneva Centre for Security Studies (GCSP), as well as briefs the Members of the European Parliament. She is member of the CSCAP EU Committee and the Europe-India Research and Dialogue Network (EIRDN).

Her research focuses on security issues within the broader Indo-Pacific region, notably related to maritime security, sovereignty disputes, regional cooperative mechanism, as well as overall issues of good ocean governance.

Dr. Alessio Patalano, Reader of the King' College London

Dr. Patalano is Reader in East Asian Warfare and Security at the Department of War Studies (DWS), King's College London (KCL), and specialises in maritime strategy and doctrine, Japanese military history and strategy, East Asian Security, and Italian defence policy. From 2006 to 2015, he was visiting



professor in Strategy at the Italian Naval War College (ISMM), Venice. In Japan, Dr Patalano has been a visiting professor at Aoyama Gakuin University and at the National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies (GRIPS), both in Tokyo, and currently is Adjunct Fellow at the Institute of Contemporary Asian Studies, Temple University Japan, a Visiting Professor at the Japan Maritime Command and Staff College (JMCSC), and a Senior Fellow at the highly influential think tank Policy Exchange.

At KCL, Dr Patalano is the Director of the Asian Security and Warfare Research Group and the King's Japan Programme.

Dr Patalano's current research focuses on maritime strategy, Chinese hybrid strategy and maritime coercion, Sino-Japanese maritime territorial disputes, Japan-Gulf security cooperation, and the relationship between military power and statecraft in Japan. He maintains active research collaborations with the Naval Postgraduate School (Monterey, CA), the China Maritime Studies Institute at the Naval War College, (Newport, RI). Dr Patalano is also involved in military education and has developed and delivered a variety of programmes on East Asian security and regional affairs in both Southeast Asia and the Gulf region
